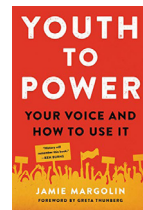
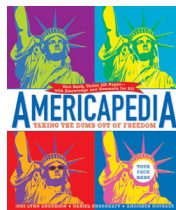


Online Library Resources
